LOCAL GREEN SPACES ASSESSMENT FOR COLEBY NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

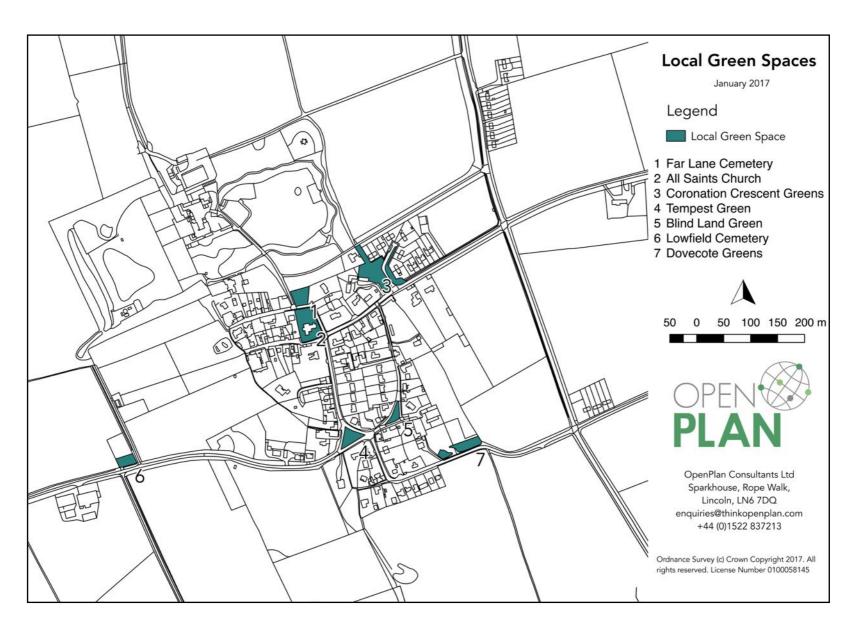
The following document is an assessment of several sites identified during the preparation of the Coleby Neighbourhood Plan (CNP) for Local Green Space Designation.

The Local Green Space Designation is defined in paragraph 76 to 78 of the National Planning Policy Framework, and it ensures that designated sites are subject to managing development policies consistent with policies for Green Belts. Paragraph 77 define the criteria to designate a specific site, namely:

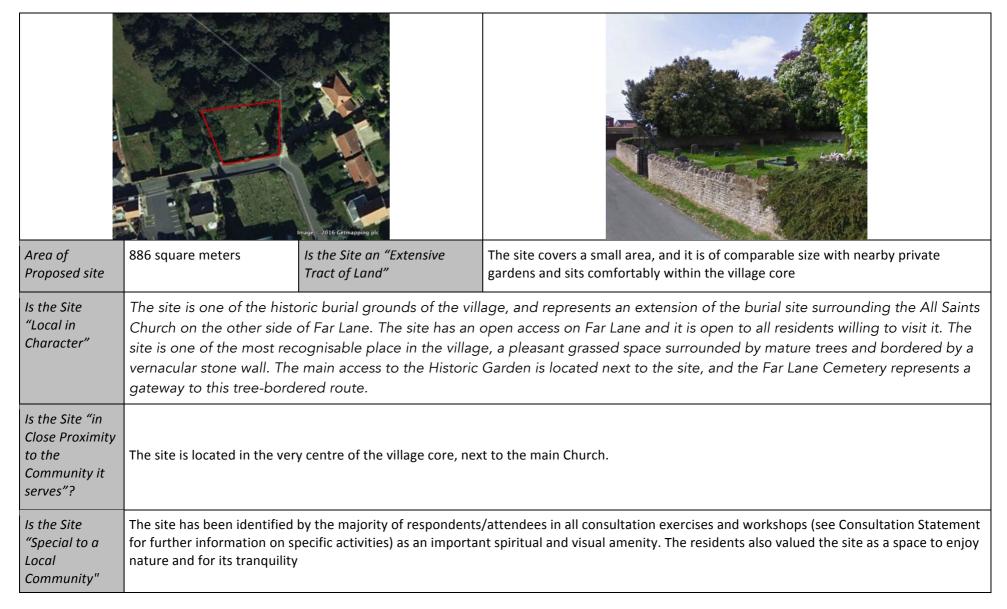
- the green space is in reasonably close proximity to the community it serves;
- the green area is demonstrably special to a local community and holds a particular local significance, for example because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquillity or richness of its wildlife; and
- the green area concerned is local in character and is not an extensive tract of land.

The following document applies a sequential test for all the sites proposed, and presents conclusions on whether or not the area is suitable for designation. Sites have been identified through a number of consultation and engagement activities with local residents, including a survey and two workshops (see Consultation Statement for further details).

In conclusion, nine sites have been identified for evaluation. Seven of them have been designated as Local Green Spaces by Policy 5 of the Coleby Neighbourhood Plan, as shown in the Local Green Spaces map. Two of them, the Area of Separation and the Area West of Developed Footprint, have been discounted due to being extensive tracts of land; however, due to their contribution to the village character and setting they have been mentioned in the CNP as important pieces of land that should be maintained undeveloped. One of them, the Area of Separation, is explicitly referred to as per Policy 3 of the CNP.

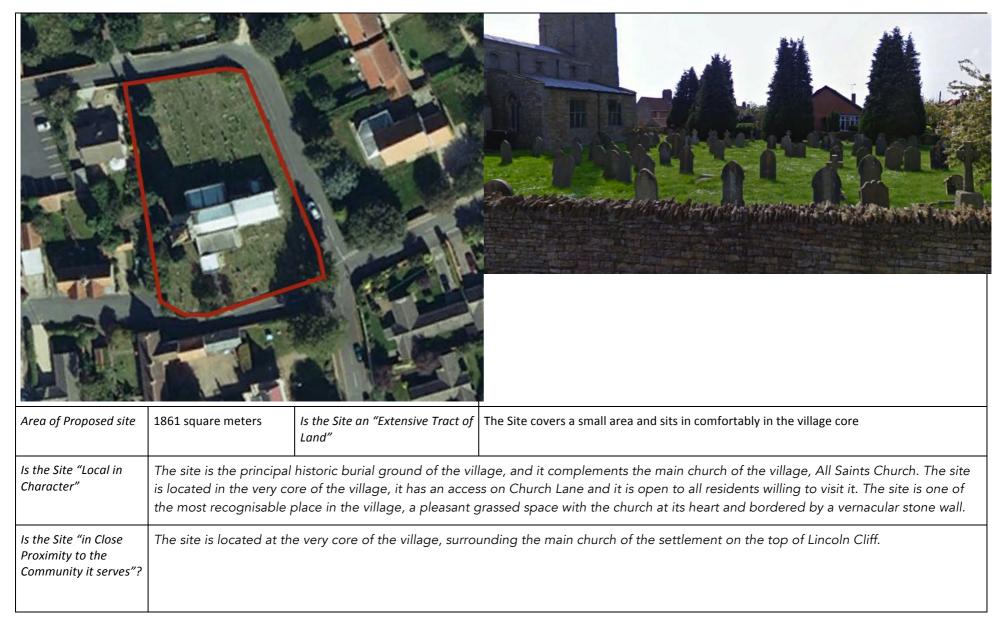

Is the Site "Special to a Local Community"	Even though the site is currently an open paddock, the residents of the Coleby demonstrated they highly value the site as a pleasant piece of open countryside and for its role in separating the village from the A607. This commitment has been demonstrated by the number of letters of objection and the Parish Council's response to the application. This interest remained unchanged when development was approved. Once developed, the two open spaces will represent a landscaped gateway coming into the village (existing mature trees and hedgerows will be retained). It will also screen the sight of the 4 new dwellings from Dovecote Lane, helping to retain the feeling of passing through the countryside when leaving the village towards the A607. 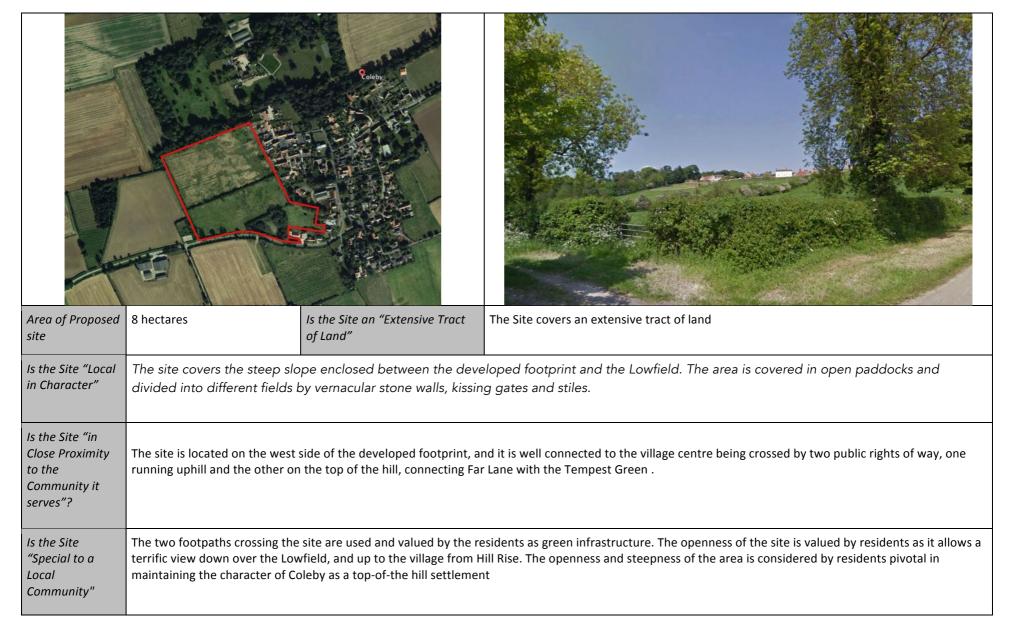
The playing field is important to the residents as complementary to the Village Hall and as a venue for several events, and has been included among the community facilities protected by Policy 7 of the Coleby Neighbourhood Plan.

On the other hand, the fields south of Rectory Road are neither used nor considered particularly special, except in terms of the role they play in separating the village from the A607.
